A "Growing Young" Story: Empathy

When I was first approached about defining "Empathy," I thought it might be easier to share the absence of empathy on the part of, for example, manufacturers of kitchen appliances who don't take actual use of a design into account – dishwashers with a level top rack, so that glasses retain a puddle of water, toaster ovens with numbers and letters too small to read in the early morning light, especially without glasses. We know when we're ignored.

On the other hand, we can see genuine empathy displayed by special people like Jeff Pethel, whose habit it is to get down on one knee for a chat with a child. He knows the unpleasant perspective of a little one, lost in a forest of pant legs and pocket books. How important it is to look someone directly in the eyes to speak straight, even only, to her or him. And to listen!

Elderly people like me find such comfort in small, kind actions of people who step beside us down the stairs; and there is the clarity of respect when a physician ceases a fixation on the computer and looks closely into the eyes of the patient, listening carefully for clues and signs to interpret the complaint. That's empathy.

Empathy is the deliberate act of someone who wants to enter the "world" of others, to walk in their shoes, to see from their perspective. It is a behavior of absolute respect. It was and is an attribute of Christ who became one of us, lived in our world, and took our place in death.

I guess Roger and I understood as missionaries that moving into a strange new culture and living for years in it, making friends for Jesus, sharing food and fellowship, would have been impossible without adjusting our own lifestyle. We had to adapt. Sometimes it was easy and fun. Often we were puzzled. We were literally in another "world," and we'd have been lost without particular local people who respectfully taught us and showed us empathy. Some were Christian brothers and sisters. One was our seminary dean who in our Malaysian later years kindly told Roger, "You don't look Chinese, but you think Chinese!"

Empathy works over generations. It's a laying down of self; it's a putting the other first; it is exhibiting a kind of cross-cultural sensitivity borne by the selfless love of Christ. As we prioritize young adults in order to "grow young," may we learn their names, and may we love them, even though there are aspects of their culture many of us won't "get" (technology, music, media). But if we seek their hearts and let them know how much we care, we can cross the culture bridges together.



Church Business Meeting

There will be a Church Business Meeting on Wednesday, May 19, at 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall (Building C).

At the Church Council Meeting on Sunday, May 2, the Constitution and By-Laws Committee submitted a proposal to make two adjustments to our current Constitution and By-Laws. With the approval of the Church Council, that proposal will now come before the Church at our upcoming business meeting on Wednesday, May 19. A copy of the proposed change is below. Copies of the proposed By-Law Changes are also available in the church office and at the tent on Sunday mornings.

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee moves to amend the following Sections of the By-Laws adjusting the voting age from 18 to 15. Specifically:

(1) In Article II - Membership, the first sentence of Section 5: Rights of Membership be amended to read as follows:

Every Resident Member at least **15** years of age (except those members who are under the process of Church discipline, see Article II, Section 7) is entitled to one vote and shall have the right to vote on the following matters:

(2) The last sentence of this Section also be amended to read

The Church Council may vote to allow voting privileges to members younger than **15** years of age concerning matters that are directly relevant to them (i.e., hiring of a Minister to Students).

The Committee also moves to amend the following Sections of the By-Laws to simplify the selection of a Search Committee by omitting the option of accepting additional nominations from the Church membership. Specifically:

(3) **In Article VI - Ministerial Leadership**, Paragraphs 2 of Section 1: Senior Pastor and Section 2: Ministerial Staff be amended to read as follows:

As to Section 1: When the Church needs a pastor, the moderator will direct the nominating committee to recommend to the Church the names of six Church members to form a Search Committee. In addition, one representative from the Personnel Committee, one representative from the Stewardship Committee, and one representative from the Deacon Council shall serve as members of the Search Committee (a total of 9). The search committee, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, shall seek the person they feel God would have to fill the position. This committee is authorized to represent the Church and make commitments and arrangements with a candidate pursuant to a possible call.

As to Section 2: The ministerial staff shall be called and employed as the Church determines the need for such positions. When the Church needs a minister, the pastor, in consultation with the moderator will direct the nominating committee to recommend to the Church the names of six Church members to form a Search Committee. In addition, one representative from the Personnel Committee, one representative from the Stewardship Committee, and one representative from the Deacon Council shall serve as members of the Search Committee (a total of 9). The pastor will serve as an ex-officio member of the committee. The search committee, under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, shall seek the person they feel God would have to fill the position. This committee is authorized to represent the Church and make commitments and arrangements with a candidate pursuant to a possible call.
